## Simple modern placemats: squares and rectangles

A pattern by Stitchin Camaro

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## About this pattern

This pattern will instruct you on how to piece together squares and rectangles to create modern placemats. The placemats will be pieced like a quilt, but there is no quilting required! If you're a seasoned quilter, these placemats are a great scrap buster. If you've never quilted or sewn before, this is a great beginner project. You can mix and match the designs to create the perfect set for your home.

## Fabric and supplies

These placemats are intended to be a scrap busting project. The amount of fabric required will vary depending on which designs you choose and if you mix and match. Fabric should be a non-stretch cotton, ideally quilting cotton. Prewash your fabric so that you can easily wash your placemats without shrinking them.

Fabric requirements for a set of 4:
1/2 yard of primary color**
1/4 yard of secondary color
11/4 yard of background color
1 yard of fusible fleece or medium weight interfacing
**A set of 4 of design \#2 will require 3/4 yard of primary color

Supplies needed:

- Sewing machine
- Thread
- Scissors or rotary cutter
- Quilting ruler (a regular ruler
will work if you don't have a large
quilting ruler)
- Fabric marking tool


## Directions

This booklet contains instructions for 4 different designs. Use the instructions for each design to assemble the top of the placemat. Each finished placemat top should be 14 1/2" $\times 181 / 2^{\prime \prime}$. Once you have assembled the tops of the placemats, follow the instructions on page 9 to finish the placemats.

As you sew, use a scant $1 / 4$ " seam allowance.
Press seams open or towards the darker fabric.

## Assembling Design \#1 Top

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## Step 1

Cut out the following pieces.
Background:
A - $141 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ (6)
Primary:
B - $101 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
C-2 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
D-61/2"x $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$

Secondary:
E-4 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
F-12 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
G-81/2" $\times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$

## Step 2

Sew the short sides of the strips of your primary and secondary colors together, matching the following pieces:
$B$ and $E$
$C$ and $F$
G and D
All strips should have a final length of 14 1/2" once sewed.

## Step 3

Sew a strip A to the BE block, long edges together like so:

Attach another background strip (A) to the BE block on the other long edge.

## Assembling Design \#1 Top

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## Step 4

Continue to assemble the 14 1/2" length strips using the following arrangement.

## Step 5

Lastly sew the two remaining A strips to either side of your block.


## Assembling Design \#2 Top

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## Step 1

Cut out the following pieces.
Background:
A - $41 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 141 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
Primary:
B-11 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 141 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
Secondary:
C-31/2" $\times 141 / 2^{\prime \prime}$


## Step 2

Sew B \& C rectangles together matching the $141 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ edges.

## Step 3

Attach the A rectangle to the long edge of C.

## Assembling Design \#3 Top

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## Step 1

Cut out the following pieces.
Background:
A - $181 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ (2)
B-10 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ (3)
C-4 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 61 / 2^{\prime \prime}(2)$
D-31/2" $\times 61 / 2^{\prime \prime}$

Primary:
E-2" $\times 61 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ (2)

Secondary:
F-61/2" $\times 61 / 2^{\prime \prime}$

## Step 2

Sew an E rectangle to either side of $D$ rectangle, match the long edges.

## Step 3

Sew a C rectangle to the combined ED block. Sew the remaining $C$ rectangle to the bottom of the $F$ rectangle. You should have the following blocks, both 10 1/2" × 6 1/2".

## Assembling Design \#3 Top

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## Step 4

Arrange the pieces that you've sewn and the piece B rectangles as shown. Sew together.

## Step 5

Lastly take two A rectangles and sew them to the top and bottom.

## Assembling Design \#4 Top

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## Step 1

Cut out the following pieces.
Background:
A - $31 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
B-5 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
C-4 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 181 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
D-6 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 181 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
Primary:
E-15 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
F-13 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$

## Step 2

Sew the following rectangles together, matching the short sides:
$A \& E$
$F \& B$

## Step 3

Arrange your pieces in the following order. Sew together to assemble.

# Putting your placemats together 

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## Step 1

Sew your placemat tops using the instructions outlined.

## Step 2

Cut out a 141/2" $\times 181 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of your background fabric. This will be the back of the placemat. Fuse* a 141/2" $\times 181 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of interfacing to the background fabric.

* Follow the instructions on your interfacing packaging.


## Step 3

Pin the interfaced back piece to your assembled placemat top, RIGHT SIDES TOGETHER. Make two marks on the short side of your placemat about 3" apart.


## Step 4

Sew around the perimeter of the placemat, starting at the bottom mark and ending at the top mark. Use a $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ inch seam allowance. When you are finished sewing your placemat should have a $3^{\prime \prime}$ hole.


## Putting your placemats together

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## Step 5

Pull the placemat right side out, using the hole. Once it is right side out, press the placemat to flatten the seams.

## Step 6

Fold and press the fabric near the hole inward, so that the raw edges of the fabric are inside the placemat.

## Step 7

Top stitch around the entire placemat, sewing the hole shut. Use a $1 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ seam allowance. You can use contrast thread for this if you'd like the top stitching to be decorative. Now your placemat is complete. Congratulations!!!
